

From the Parish Council



Welcome to issue no.182 of the Toppesfield & Gainsford End Newsletter.

In the last Newsletter in May, we were eagerly looking forward to June 21 and the lifting of the final covid related restrictions. We were anticipating a return to a more normal life, with events like the Church Fete scheduled for early July. As we now know, all those hopes were dashed by the announced delay to the final lifting of lockdown measures. The new date (all being well) will be 19th July but that unfortunately means that the Church Fete, due to take place on 3rd July, has been postponed. Likewise, the 'Tea & Cake Welcome' for new arrivals in the village on 26th June had to be deferred to a future date. Keep your eyes and ears open for information about possible new dates for these events.

The rules, however, did permit the holding of a village market on 19th June and another is planned for 10th July. Social distancing rules and control of numbers in the village hall will still be in place but it is good to see the market taking place again. Likewise on 4th July, the Cricket Club will be opening its delayed season at Gestingthorpe; if the weather is good, it would be a pleasant afternoon out.

The parish council has now returned to 'in person' meetings. Our first was the June meeting – socially distanced and there continues to be a limit to numbers allowed in at any one time. Please remember that the public are welcome to attend these meetings, which normally take place on the first Thursday each month. There is a time slot of 15 minutes at the beginning during which parishioners can ask questions and comment on topics.

You will see later in this newsletter an item about the proposal for the council to purchase the Green Man Barn. You should also have received a note setting out the background to this. The parish council is supportive of exploring this plan fully as are TCP and David and Paul in the Green Man. We believe it will provide benefits to the village without increasing the precept (the village part of your council tax). One of the key challenges that villages of our size face is to making our community sustainable for future generations; the greater the range of amenities we have and the better condition they are in, the more likely we will be to make Toppesfield sustainable. We need not only to keep existing facilities but improve and develop them.

Talking of which, we are also looking at enhancing the playing field with new play equipment (under advice from the children using the field), planting more trees and hedges, improving the pavilion so it is more attractive to more groups and various other things. We'll give more details as we move forward with the plans.

On the environmental front, the council is looking to put in place an Environmental Policy for discussion at our July meeting. Along with most councils, we are increasingly aware of the need for us all to take action to address the big challenges facing us and it is important that local councils, large and small play their part. We are also trying to improve the look of the village. New village signs were put up in May and the next project is to smarten up the parish street signs: details are in this issue.

Finally, don't forget that the parish council has an amount each year that is available as grants to village groups and organisations. In line with best practice, we ask that applicants provide some funding from their own resources and provide us with basic financial details of their organisation. Application forms can be obtained from Kaaren, the parish clerk.

Notice from the Parish Council

As you will probably know, the parish council has been discussing with TCP the possibility of purchasing the barn at the side of the Green Man and in principle has agreed a price of $\pm 55,0000$.

The council is now in the process of seeking the views of residents about the plans for the barn and we hope to conclude that process by the end of July.

It is important that we have views from the community about our plans. Despite what some seem to think, there is no 'done deal'. There is however a process which we have to follow and that is why we invite your views and are following the procedures recommended by Essex Association of Local Councils.

During the last week, every household should have received a leaflet outlining the plans and the reasoning behind them. The parish council invites comments on the plans and these will be taken into account before any final decision is taken.

To reiterate, the key points are:

- The council believes there are 3 main benefits from its proposal, which are:
 - It will provide a fit-for-purpose parish office for the clerk. The current space occupied in the village hall is small and unsuitable, is not able to accommodate the parish safe (which contains some confidential documents) and has no easy access to running water and toilet facilities;
 - As part of the project a multi-use room could be created at the front end of the barn and be available for use when the village hall is unavailable (currently 5 mornings and 3 afternoons a week);
 - The proceeds of the sale of the barn could be used to enable TCP to enhance the facilities of the Green Man, which the council sees as a critical part of the village social infrastructure.
- The council proposes to borrow from the Public Works Loan Board to help finance the purchase and renovation costs. This finance would be long term (50 years) at a rate of interest fixed for the entire period; currently the rate is about 2.30%pa.
- The cost of financing the loan would be covered by savings in rent currently paid for the parish office, the rent paid by the brewery and new income from the rent of the multi-use room.
- There would be no increase in the precept caused by the servicing of the loan.
- The village would gain a useful new asset.

Great news is the restarting of the monthly Village Market. This is where local producers of all sorts fresh meat, pastries, crafts, preserves, jewellery and more. Very low carbon footprint! The first one has been held on Saturday 19th June in the village hall. Do keep an eye out for future dates and support your local market.

Now is the time when we look back on the last financial year of the shop and hold our Annual General Meeting. Having had a huge increase in takings in April, May and June last year sadly takings have now dropped right back to where they were, more or less, before Covid. This is both sad and worrying. If there is some product or newspaper or magazine that you want please ask and we will do our best to supply it. However as always true to our remit we do return money to the community in the form of grants and this year we have awarded grants to Toppesfield Primary School for their sensory garden, the Environmental Group towards planting of trees and the Cricket Club towards improving the facilities.

I will be standing down from the committee at the AGM. Do have a think about becoming involved in this vital and exciting village facility. We need new ideas. Last year we had our AGM in September on Zoom but this year we are holding the AGM LIVE!

Toppesfield Community Village Shop AGM will be held on Thursday 15th July 2021 in Toppesfield Village Hall at 7.00 pm. All are welcome but to comply with Covid regulations we are limited to 30 people and would ask that you wear a mask. Do come and get involved.

Jobs involved will be as follows:

Liaising with Anglian (wave) water for compliance inspections, Applying for funding & grants, Updating the constitution, Enrolment of allotments holders into NSALG, Raising yearly plot agreements and collecting fees, Maintaining accounts on Excel and running the Bank account. Coordinating ground maintenance and servicing of Equipment, Organising events such as coach tours when allowed after Covid restrictions. Setting up working parties etc. etc.

The allotments are doing very nicely thank you since the wet and cold weather of May has passed.

The Allotment grounds continue to be visited by Parishioners with it being the only open green space that is accessible to all, for dog walking, and just a nice place to congregate and chat with fellow Toppesfield residents on the extensive green space provided by the committee.

We managed to keep the community orchard fruit trees alive last year through the drought, but we may not be able to do this year due to the PC not supporting the group with a small grant that has previously been given. Even though there is no change that we were aware of in the regulations that precludes this happening.

To say we are extremely disappointed is an understatement. Bearing in mind the amount of work that is carried out on PC owned land using Allotment owned equipment such as lawn mowers, strimmer's and wheel barrows etc.

It is part of a Parish Councils obligation to provide an allotment space, we as a society have done this on a voluntary basis for the last 10 years.

We may reintroduce the coach trip to an agricultural or a flower show again next year after a long Covid lockdown which will be open as usual to all parishioners and friends.

Tommo's tips

Growing Sweetcorn – How to Grow Sweetcorn – A Guide to Growing Sweetcorn



Straight from the plant, sweetcorn is one of the most delicious vegetables for the home grower. Sweetcorn used to be a difficult crop to grow away from the south of the country as it needed a long, warm growing season. However, the development of new varieties has changed that. It still needs a long growing season but the main reasons for failure are overcrowding and under feeding. It produces masses of tall foliage and is not really

It produces masses of tall foliage and is not really suitable for container growing or close spacing.

Sowing and Growing Sweetcorn

- Sweetcorn needs a lot of nitrogen to provide food for its growth. It requires plenty
 of space and to be planted in a way that encourages pollination poor pollination
 results in patchy development of the corn kernels.
 - There are two methods of cultivation. The first is my own fussy, but never fails to produce a good crop with a high germination rate from what is expensive seed:



Germinated Sweetcorn After Just 3 Days!

- Start in late April–early May. Chit (or sprout) the seed first. Lay a sheet of damp kitchen paper in the base of a shallow, lidded container. Place the seeds on the paper and cover with another sheet of damp paper. Pop the lid on the container and put it in a warm, dark place (around 78°F/20°C an airing cupboard is ideal). After three days check to see if any have sprouted, and then check daily. Usually, the seeds will sprout within a day or so of each other.
- As soon as the seeds have started to sprout, plant them 3 cm (1 inch) deep into multi-purpose compost in 8 cm (3 inch) pots or root trainers. You can also use toilet roll inner tubes filled with compost, but they tend to dry out quickly so will need a daily spray with water if necessary (the tubes are planted out and will rot away in the soil). Water with tepid, not cold water, to avoid shocking the seedlings.
- Keep the seeds warm (over 50°F/10°C). Cover with fleece if cold, particularly at night. Warm the final planting position with a cloche or fleece **before** planting out.
- Once the plants are around 10 cm (4 inches) tall, plant out into holes 5 cm (2 inches) deeper than your pots, filling the holes to the soil level of the plants, so that they are sitting in a small depression. If you didn't manure the soil the preceding winter, sprinkle a little dried blood or sulphate of ammonia around each plant to provide the nitrogen boost they need to get off to a good start. Cover with cloches and leave them on until the plants push them away with their own growth.
- When the plants reach 60 cm (24 inches), draw soil up around the stem, filling in the depression and a little above. This encourages strong root growth. Keep weed-free.
- In June apply a liquid feed to boost cob production, either a comfrey feed or a general purpose liquid fertilizer.

The alternative, simpler method of cultivation, standard:

- Sow directly into the soil mid-May, dropping two seeds in a hole 3 cm (1 inch) deep: if both seeds germinate, remove the weaker one. Cover with a cloche or use clear plastic 2-litre drinks bottles, with the bases removed, over each plant as mini -cloches.
- If the leaves look yellowish or the plants do not seem to be growing quickly, try a high-nitrogen liquid feed which should effect a fast recovery.

• Plant out in blocks (not rows or you'll get poor pollination), with at least 45–60 cm (18 inches–2 feet) between plants each way.

Harvesting Sweetcorn

- It's a fine line between under-ripe and over-ripe, when the corn hardens.
- Sweetcorn is ready to harvest when the tassels hanging from each cob turn brown. Double check by carefully peeling back the leaves and pinching a kernel – if the juice is milky then they are ready to pick. Just twist the cob away from the plant.

Pests and Problems with Sweetcorn

- Pigeons can be a pest, pulling away the leaves and eating the kernels.
- Earwigs are partial to sweetcorn. Try stuffing plant pots with hay or shredded paper and placing them in and around the plants. The earwigs will hide in the pots just shake them out, well away from your vegetable garden.

Varieties of Sweetcorn

- The 'super sweet' F1 varieties are extremely tasty. The 'tender sweet' have a less chewy texture.
- Lark F1 is an excellent variety; Sundance F1 is better for freezing and more reliable if you live in the north.
- Never inter-mix varieties as they will cross-pollinate, with unpredictable results. If you do grow two varieties, they must be at least 8 metres (27 feet) apart.

Eating Sweetcorn

- The connoisseur's advice is to put a pan of water on to boil and then run (not walk!) back to the kitchen with your freshly harvested cobs, since the moment they are picked, the natural sugars begin to turn to starch.
- However, sweetcorn keeps well for a week or so in the fridge and a glut can be frozen on or off the cob.
- Try the cobs on the barbecue, leaving them in the leaves for protection as the corn cooks in its own steam.

Keep Your Plot Producing

We take an awful lot out of our plots and you don't get something for nothing in life. Eventually we exhaust the soil and the yield plummets. Potatoes are a hungry crop and to get a decent follow-on crop add some fertiliser.

You can add a balanced fertiliser like Growmore or better still in my book; fish, blood and bone. The reason I think FBB is better is that it releases more slowly. Don't over do it though, if the soil is in good heart you probably only need 40 or 50 grams per square metre to boost things.

BBQ Using the ash

As we move into summer, out comes the BBQ. As the cooking finishes and the charcoal burns out, throw any bones onto the fire. The minerals in the bones are a plant nutrient. Once things are cool, just add the ashes to the compost heap.



So much of what we throw away can be profitably recycled with a little thought and ingenuity.

Since then, we are really pleased to be welcoming everyone back inside too. It is very refreshing running the pub....once again.

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Introduction to Peter McMillian, the new farmer of the Berwick Hall estate.

Last year Berwick Hall farm was sold and the new owner is keen to introduce himself to parishioners.

Normally, of course, they would have got to know many people by now at village events, but the past year has not been normal.

I am Peter McMillan and, together with my wife Angela, was lucky enough to be able to purchase Berwick Hall Farm from the Clark family last September.

I thought it would be helpful to everyone if I took this opportunity to introduce us.

We are from farming families who were brought up in Stisted and West Hanningfield. We live in the village of Boreham in the original family farm bought by my grandfather in 1922. When we got married in 1968 we moved into Old Hall, a large house dating from 15th century through to 19th century, which had been un-occupied for 17 year: quite a challenge at 23 years old.

We have both been involved in various village activities. While I was on the parish council for 20 years my wife got involved in starting an Edward Bear group for young children in the church and also established a handbell group.

On my weekly trips to Toppesfield I have made myself known to quite a few of you when I see you walking the footpaths.

As you will have seen, we are attempting to improve the look of the farm buildings at Berwick Hall, which may take some time, but we have made a start.

I have also asked James Nott, my contractor, to try to keep the footpaths easily marked and have asked for the deep ruts on the edge of Berwickhall Wood to be levelled when they eventually dry out. As for the wood itself, we are very happy to see the children from St Margaret's continuing to enjoy Forest School trips there.

It has been brought to our notice that there is concern about the mild smell from the digestate that has been spread in the growing crops. This material is the by-product of waste food and various plant-based material that goes into anaerobic digesters that produce gas. The gas then either goes straight to a gas pipeline or is fed to an engine to produce green electricity.

We look forward to meeting more of you and we are enjoying our custodianship of the farm.
