

From the Parish Council



For the first time in almost two years, we can put together a Newsletter where COVID is not a seemingly neverending cloud hovering over us and affecting every single thing we do.

Moreover, it's time to look ahead to some really interesting activities and events that will be taking place in Toppesfield this year.

The really big event of course will be the Platinum Jubilee celebrations in early June. An organising group has already started meeting and planning a series of activities for the four days from the 2nd to 5th of June. You will get a flavour of what the group is planning on page 13 of this Newsletter. If you are able to assist in any, way your help and support will be very welcome; you can contact our Clerk, Kaaren Berry, for more information. Kaaren's contact details are on the page opposite.

This will be followed a couple of weeks later by the arrival of the 'Big Top' in Toppesfield, the first time that the circus is coming to town. A few early bird tickets remain; you can request them by emailing the pre-school, which is organising the event to raise funds to support its increasing activities. See the back page of the Newsletter for more information. Having an active and successful pre-school in the village together with the other community focused facilities -school, shop, pub, brewery – makes the village more attractive as a place to live, more sustainable and, according to widely used statistics, increases the value of properties. So, support your village and support yourselves!

We are also holding another 'Coffee, Cake and Catch-up' on Saturday 26th March at the Village Hall. This will be the third such session and we are pleased to advise that our District Councillor, Richard van Dulken is supporting the cost of the event from his discretionary grant fund. This is a very pleasant way of spending an hour or two, catching up with people (and let's be honest, we've been able to do little of that over the past 24 months) and sampling some delicious cakes!

A new addition to the Newsletter is a brief review of what was discussed at the most recent parish council meetings (overleaf). As explained there, the council is represented on the Wethersfield Airbase Scrutiny Committee, which meets monthly to keep updated on what is going on in the background of this proposal. Meetings have been held with our local MP and more are planned or being sought in coming months with the MOD and Ministry of Justice. As of yet, no planning application has been submitted to Braintree District Council but one is expected imminently.

When we delivered the last Newsletter, we inserted a brief questionnaire about the views of parishioners about the prisons proposal and we would like to thank those who responded.

In total we had responses from 46 people (from an adult population of about 450). Of these 46:

- 30 were strongly opposed
- 4 were somewhat opposed
- 5 had no strong views
- 5 were somewhat in favour

These are major decisions being taken about our immediate area so it is important that everyone has a say; even if you have no strong views one way or the other, it is important to let that be known. Ultimately, the MOD will dispose of the airbase, so something will be done with the hundreds of acres there.

Finally, the parish council is in the process of establishing a community charity to support village groups and activities. More information will be available over the coming months.

Parish Council Information

A short summary of Parish Council minutes will now be included in each Newsletter. This is the first one, and covers the January and February Meetings.

- Essex County Councillor Peter Schwier reported:
 - There could be an increase of 4.5% in the Essex County Council portion of the Council Tax for the coming financial year – this being 1.5% from last year, 1% for social care and 2% in core council tax. The council are still looking at efficiency and savings and their proportion of the council tax has not increased in several years.
 - The Climate Change Action fund in still open and welcoming applications of up to £20,000 per project.
 - ◊ The Arts & Culture Fund has opened in the last few days.
 - There have been lots of reported incidents relating to PROW (Public Rights of Way) which are being looked at.
- Braintree District Councillor Richard van Dulken reported:
 - ◊ The latest planning application for the Fishing Lakes in Great Yeldham is due for a decision shortly.
 - O He thanked everyone for the patience regarding the waste collections over the holiday period as crews were given a week off during Christmas and New Year. Subsequent delays were due to covid and other illnesses.
 - Ocuncillor van Dulken also reported he has not heard anything further regarding a planning application for the proposed Wethersfield Prison.
- The coffee morning in the Village Hall for all residents was well attended and went well. It was agreed to organise the next one on Saturday March 26th.
- The beacon on the playing field in Toppesfield has been inspected and repaired in preparation for the Jubilee Celebration, 300 trees and shrubs have been planted on the playing field in Toppesfield and work on the school pond area is due to commence later in the year. Plans for the pavilion to incorporate toilets and the petanque court locations are being drawn up. The new play equipment has been installed and is being used frequently.
- Toppesfield Community Pub committee (TCP) are supportive for the shop to occupy the end section of the barn but there is no decision as yet as to sell the barn or lease it to the shop.
- It was agreed to try and catalogue all the historical items relating to the village that residents may have.
- Following a number of occurrences of delivery vans getting stuck in Mallows Lane, it was agreed to investigate a sign indicating there is no turning area.

Also for your information the two representatives for Toppesfield are Alan Collard and Trisha Roberts for the multi-Parish Council group WASC (Wethersfield Airbase Scrutiny Committee).

The Parish Council meets on the first Thursday of each month at 7.30pm.

Residents are encouraged to bring any issues for discussion to the meeting, the first 15 minutes of which are a public meeting.

We extend our greatest sympathy to her family and friends .



Once the sap starts to rise and the vines become more supple, we will tie them down on to the wires to provide the structure they need to grow during the summer. The vines are dormant during the winter so we don't need to worry about frosts until May when a late frost can damage any buds that have formed in April/May. We have a new machine this year which we hope will drive off any late frosts – and mean that we don't need to drive up and down the vineyard during the night with our gas blowers (you may have come across these heaters in the marquee behind the pub on cold music nights...).


### St. Margaret's C of E Primary School

We have started this half term with our first parent event in a long time when key stage 2 came into school for a star gazing event in the evening. A lovely time was had by all. We now look forward to book week, world book day and our Easter activities going ahead.

### **Toppesfield Woman's Institute**

Did you know that there was a W.I. in the village? there are still some founder members living in Toppesfield and Gainsford End. All of us who belonged over the years have happy memories of yes, 'jam and Jerusalem!' but most importantly, fun and friendship.

Toppesfield W.I. was started up in 1972 and celebrated its 40th anniversary in 2012. Unfortunately, due to falling membership, there was no choice but to close in 2013.

Former members are anxious to ensure that the existing records are kept in a way that is accessible to the community and safe for posterity. There are photographs, newspaper cuttings, scrap books and a much loved tablecloth. As a new member joined they were invited to embroider their names around the edge of a cloth. This is unique. The books and photographs are fascinating. We feel that it is important to keep these 'historical memories' safe within the village.

I am waiting to hear where the village can store this particular archive. In the meantime it will remain at my house. If the village ever feels it does not want to keep them then the County Federation Archives have requested to have them.

These artefacts have been used in the Church for a historical display and were displayed at the

100 year old birthday celebration of a past member. If you know of anyone or any organisation who would like to use them for a display or research into village history, please contact me.

# TABLECLOTH

Toppesfield & Gainsford Women's Institute was formed in 1972

In July 1975 a suggestion to make a tablecloth for the President's Table was approved by all members at the monthly meeting.

It was decided to have an appropriate motif in one corner....with a border on which all members would embroider their signature.

The white linen was purchased in August 1975. It was cut into 4 squares of 65 cms, which would be 'faggoted' together and the double thickness border attached, giving a tablecloth 150 cms. square. (see photo 1)

Everyone was asked to submit designs for the motif ....and members voted overwhelmingly for the 'Pump' motif designed by Jennifer Hodgkinson (see photo 2) depicting two items of significance to our W.I.:-

 The Village Dump\_\_\_\_\_an oak shelter erected in the centre of the village over the two pumps in 1897 to commemorate the recent Golden Jubilee of Queen Victoria.

 Oak Leaves \_\_\_\_\_\_as our W.I. belongs to the 'Oak Group'

of W.1.'s in our local area.

Silks were purchased in autumnal colours and whilst two volunteers worked on the main motif, sections of the border were distributed among members for them to start embroidering their signatures.

After many months the work was completed...... then Pat Barnard and her team of 'faggoters' began the task of sewing all parts of the cloth and its borders together.

On November 1st 1977 at the monthly meeting, the then President, Ann Clark, unveiled the completed cloth for all members to see .... and it has been in constant use for the last twenty-seven years.

During this time more than 150 members have added their signature to the border!

### Wethersfield Airfield Prison Proposal Update

Both groups formed to oppose the Ministry of Justice (MoJ) mega prison proposal have been very busy since the last newsletter update.

SWAP – Stop Weathersfield Airbase Prisons – is a campaign run by The Fields Association which was formed in response to the MoJ proposals. The Fields Association now has its website up and running <u>www.thefieldsassociation.org</u> and as soon as the bank account is established (this has taken an inordinate amount of time as there has been a high incidence of fraud using community bank accounts in the last two years) you will be able to join the association through the website. Please explore the website and use the contact button to get in touch with the SWAP team.

SWAP plans to distribute a leaflet to every household within the 10 parishes that currently make up WASC - Weathersfield Airbase Scrutiny Committee once the bank account is live.

A SMAR demonstration was hold in Creat Rendfield on Fahrware 10<sup>th</sup> and this has how

A SWAP demonstration was held in Great Bardfield on February 19<sup>th</sup> and this has been reported in the local press. Three women came from London as representatives from The Community for Action on Prison Expansion (CAPE) supported the demo having picked up the message from SWAP on social media. The CAPE website is <u>www.cape-campaign.org</u>.

The SWAP team have also been engaging Braintree District Council, asking questions at the full council meetings. These sessions are available to view on YouTube and the latest session (February  $21^{st}$ ) is at <u>Council - 21/02/22 - YouTube</u>. SWAP also participated in the December meeting. All questions are taken early in the meetings, so you don't have to watch for hours!

The Wethersfield Airbase Museum is currently closed, but the Curator, Ross Stewart, had recently made presentations about the History of the Base in Wethersfield and Sible Hedingham. His illustrated talk was followed by a short presentation by some member of the SWAP team, explaining the reality of the MoJ proposal. It seems that few people really appreciate the size and brutal architecture of the proposed mega prisons nor the impact it will have on the surrounding area.

On Friday March 25<sup>th</sup>, Ross will be giving his illustrated talk at Toppesfield Village Hall, so please save the date and keep your eyes open for further information.

Drone footage of the Five Wells Prison at Wellingborough is available on YouTube at <u>Wellingborough's</u> <u>HMP Five Wells Mega Prison - What's your thoughts? - YouTube</u>. This prison is the same design but only half the size of the proposed mega prison development at Wethersfield. It's worth taking a look (start about 5 minutes in) and imagining such a brutal concrete development in our idyllic rural landscape.

WASC, the multi-Parish Council Committee, has been active on more technical issues such as starting to establish a baseline for traffic in the area, and obtaining an expert view regarding the brownfield status (or not!) of the proposed development site. WASC is also working to obtain access to the Ministry of Defence plans for the whole site, and has responded positively to the MoJ white paper on Prison Strategy (it gives lots of reasons why the Airbase is not a suitable location for a prison).

### Toppesfield Village Hall

The village hall has had a busy year despite all the Covid restrictions. We managed to keep open for the pre-school and many of our regular clubs. Sadly we have not had Thai chi or dance group return as yet but we live in hope. Thank you to all those who have taken heed of the various restrictions that were in place at various times, with abiding by and producing risk assessments, one–way systems, mask wearing , restricted numbers etc.

The investments and improvements made over last few years are paying off in terms of increased bookings, hall is now nicely warm and inviting whatever the outside weather. For our younger generation the hall seems to be the 'in' place for children's parties, or it just that parents have realised the advantages of a larger venue and noise not an issue.

New chair storage area has allowed more room and the danger of bruised shins from slipping chairs. The trolley has been repaired and is now glides along super smooth, holds 18 if stacked correctly so please use when hirers have a number of chairs out.

We soon filled the new space with the purchase of a state of the art Cornilleau table tennis table, for those that understand these things! Easy to put up and down and move along.

We have the addition of a table tennis club on a Thursday afternoon currently. Table is available to hire privately too once hirers are aware of how to 'operate' it. £9/hour for quality family fun time and exercise to boot.

Monday evening are now booked with a Yoga session with a very popular local instructor, that I'm sure will prove very popular.

To continue with the improvements of the hall we are installing instantaneous hot water heaters into the toilets and the kitchen. This is a win win, will save us energy and water and ensure hot water readily available instead of waiting an hour or so, if and when customers remember to switch on the old water heater. No excuse for not having a 20 second sing along hand wash now.

We are having new fast broadband installed shortly, which will be available to hirers so offers many potential opportunities for customers, and will allow better control of our heating system remotely which is currently at the mercy of a poor signal.



We are also starting a sponsored slim for Lent. (1st March- Easter Sunday).


