From the Parish Council



When we started putting together this Newsletter, we thought that Spring would be well underway by now and memories of Winter would be fading. How wrong we were; despite the heroic efforts of spring flowers, like those on the front cover, the weather has been and continues to be decidedly wintery. But, by the time this Newsletter is delivered over the first weekend of March perhaps it will have changed again. Or not.

Despite the weather we have plenty of things to look forward to.

The **VE Day anniversary celebrations for 8th May**, being put together by Jacqui Burnett and her team, continue to progress. You will see below that Jacqui has a couple of specific requests for help. If you can assist with these, or anything else, she would love to hear from you.

On **21st March, a drop-in event for the Neighbourhood Plan** will be held in the Village Hall between 10:30 and 14:30. This whole exercise is an opportunity for you to influence the village's future, so please try to come along.

An important amenity in the village is the allotment area. This year sees the **10th anniversary of the re-(welly)boot of the allotments**. An overview of what has been achieved appears later and congratulations are due to all those who have transformed what had been a weed infested and overgrown area of the village, especially Paul Thompson and Rob Stafford-Baker.

Most of you will have experienced the somewhat chaotic work undertaken by contractors for County Broadband over the last month. The Parish Council did write a strong letter of complaint to County Broadband (copied to County and District councillors and Highways) but as we go to press no response has been received. On a far more positive broadband note, BT/Openreach has completed all its work in the village and in a far less disruptive manner. We hope that by the time you receive this you will all be able to access ultra-fast connections which will put **Toppesfield amongst the top 10% of communities nationally for broadband speed**. We should acknowledge the huge amount of work and knowledge that Chris Neale has brought to make this happen for all our benefit.

You will find in the Newsletter another article under the by-line 'Gaia', who, in ancient Greek mythology, was the mother goddess who presided over the earth. Today, we are all aware of the risks to the earth and the vital need to address issues such as carbon reduction, resource management, habitat and species protection. The articles by 'Gaia' have so far been written by different parishioners; if you would like to write something yourself on the topic please get in touch with Kaaren Berry.

Last, but by no means least, we would all like to wish Sally Croft and her family well. Sally is moving on to the next stage of her life with her ordination this summer, followed by undertaking the curacy at Ingatestone and Fryerning. Sally and her family have always been active and enthusiastic participants in village life and will leave a gap in the village.

Sights and Sounds in Toppesfield Village Hall

Hirers of Toppesfield Village Hall may not know that, amongst the equipment also available for use in the Hall, is a Projector and Screen facility and a PA Audio System. The computer-driven projector set-up, kindly donated by Peter and Jane Moore, is accompanied by a large rollup screen. The system can project PowerPoint presentations, photographs, and videos. The PA system, purchased by a grant from The Sainsbury Foundation, consists of two powered speakers, a 4-channel mixer deck, and two wi-fi microphones. It is suitable for public speaking, auctions, and amplification of music and singing, amongst other things. Instruction booklets are available to assist in setting up.

Allotments and Community Orchard update nearly a decade on.

As we enter into the 10th year of the rejuvenation of the allotments, the committee thought it pertinent to review where we have got to on our journey and some of the events that have been key to the development of the society.

It started with tackling the wild bush and brambles and dumping ground that we took over, with many man-hours of volunteer sweat capital, from myself, Rob Stafford-Baker, Jason Keeble, Nick Hasler, Fran Laskowski, Steve Amerio, Mike James and Barnaby Daines with his digger, Peter Moore with his tractor and flail & Oscar Pickess for ploughing the site. Let's hope we haven't forgotten anyone!

One of the many key features needed in the allotment was to install water, which we managed to do with a grant funded via Edible Essex ,a scheme that ran for 3years through the RCCE, so we were able to install a complete water system with the addition of some donated pipework. Edible Essex also funded our orchard of fruit trees, including cooking apples & pears, cherries (if the birds don't get there first). Peter Grassick helped with nets over the last couple of years, but the birds still managed to get there before us! We have some lovely eating apple trees and some plums. We have always told parishioners to please do go and help yourself.

A few years ago, we put on coach trips to various venues, mainly garden related of course, but also Country shows. This is something that we would like to consider re-starting again. On return from the trips we always arranged for a dinner in the community pub. The trips made a small profit allowing for many years of free allotments for all members.

Quiz nights, Sausage Sizzles with a bonfire, produce sales and the likes, all helped to raise money for the upkeep of the space.

A thank you also has to go to the community shop who have helped fund a couple of really big sturdy wheelbarrows & strimmer, still in use and in good condition.

Also, a thanks to the Mortlock brothers, Ted & Dennis, very sadly no longer with us, who helped Rob Stafford- Baker and me build the bridge from the recreation ground to the field around the side of the allotment. This allows vehicle access once again, without disturbing the church grounds. Kimplas Ltd did the pipework donation for the culvert, with my Jeep helping to pull up all the roots. We have also had donations of manure from the local farms, the Mortlocks and the stables in Finchingfield (we allotmenteers do love a bit of the smelly stuff).

We even arranged to have the ground blessed by the Church! What a lovely time that was.

We have lost a few allotmenteers over the years, and struggled to sign up new ones; some have just given up and some have moved away from the village but with new vigour for the coming season, we have now got a virtually full complement, with interest shown for smaller plots.

Special mentions must go to Rob and Linda. Rob has maintained the grasslands and hedgerows, which is a big task in itself to take on and needs many voluntary man hours, especially in the summer. Linda has made a fine job of the community herb garden, giving her time and financing to make it a really lovely space. With the effort from these two, it means that the allotment is a nice place to go and sit and contemplate, read or take in the wildlife or walk the dog through linking up with the network of village pathways!

(Please pick up any dog mess either on the Allotments or on the pathways around the allotments.)

The space is abundant with wildlife: rabbits, kites, pigeons, other birds and indigenous species.

Mike James! Thanks for being the stalwart lone allotmenteer who maintained his and Mary's allotment for many years, and inspired us to forge forward in creating the space that is here today for all the village to enjoy.

There were some concerns over the rejuvenation of the space interfering with the wildlife, but the way the site has been managed (with the driving force behind the planning of the grasslands being Rob Stafford-Baker with the planting of comfrey), in the summer the amount of bees that we attract is an amazing sound. We have some ideas in place to attract more...watch this space for Owl Houses, Hedgehog Homes, and Bird Boxes. Mrs T (Clare) was instrumental in securing funding for the two orchard spaces.

I have penned this article in the Parish Mag for 9 years with a supplement of Tommo's Tips for all to marvel at the horticultural knowledge gleaned from Tinternet (Yorkshire google speak). Over the last 2 years, for personal reasons, I have not been able to devote as much time to this fabulous facility which is, in fact, a benefit to all who use it or even just walk through it, but I can assure you that although not present in body on occasions, I was definitely there in spirit. I have always been available via phone or text, but return with renewed vigour and enthusiasm for the coming years.

We have updated the Tenancy Agreements to all current allotmenteers, to be given out (if you haven't already received them) at the up and coming meeting. We also look forward to getting some new fundraising ideas from everyone involved with the project.

A new WhatsApp Group has been set up for ease of contact so any initial ideas can be put on this valuable social media tool. The notice boards will also be used more efficiently. Discussions are ongoing to start another Social Media page.

Anyone interested in an allotment of any size please do get in touch.

- Sow seeds. ...
- Get planting.



Toppesfield Parish Neighbourhood Plan

Things are now moving apace! Wynne-Williams Associates have now started working up our Landscape Character Assessment

As we noted in the last Newsletter, the unique natural beauty of our area will be described in the Landscape Character Assessment, which will then be used to inform other planning policies. A Landscape Character Assessment is a process to identify and understand the things that give character to the landscape. Understanding the character of an area is the vital first step in making almost any landscape-related decision, whether it is for a village street or an entire region.

In essence, Gill Wynne-Williams will co-ordinate the creation of a visual archive of hand-drafted maps and surveys, annotated sketches and hand-drawn pictures. This will include photographs of landscape features at different times of the year. This is going to need the active involvement of the whole community, so please get involved by taking photographs of your favourite landscape features that you would wish to see retained for the future enjoyment of us all. Once you have an account if you search for "toppesfieldviews", you should then be able to click follow and then be able to see the page.

The Housing Needs Survey questionnaire is also just getting its final tweak. We hope to be sending these out with the Parish Newsletter. It will be similar to the one you may remember from 2015, but updated for 2020. This is being organised by Laura Atkinson at the Rural Community Council of Essex, (RCCE). Please do try to complete and return these questionnaires as they provide vital data for assessing possible future housing needs. In order to provide help and guidance for completing the questionnaire, we are holding an "open to all" drop-in event at the Village Hall in Saturday 21st March, as advertised opposite!

The purpose of this event is to introduce the concept of the Neighbourhood Plan, and show you the progress that has been made so far. There will be displays providing information the Vision Statement and Objectives, as well as the Landscape Character Assessment, Housing Needs Survey, Design Code, Community Businesses & Facilities, as well as proving opportunities for you to let us know your views and thoughts going forward. The Steering Group Committee and members of the RCCE will also be present to help with any questions you may have regarding filling in the Housing Needs Survey questionnaire or anything else that may be of interest to you.

Please do make the effort to come along. It is an opportunity for you to help shape the future of our Parish over the next quarter century!

Better Broadband is nearly here!

Work to install the new Openreach Fibre Optic Broadband network is almost complete with all new overhead cables and connection boxes installed and being tested ready for you to order Ultrafast Broadband from service providers such as BT, Zen, Freeola and very soon Sky. A

few sections are left to be completed that require some tree pruning and some more digging work.

The new fibre optic network will provide speeds up to 330mb/s! An enormous improvement over the current speeds available in the village. The school will soon also be able to receive Ultrafast Broadband speeds so the pupils can access content and learning faster than before.

Thank you to all of you who have helped make this project a reality with many signing up for government provided vouchers which have paid for the project in full along with a generous grant from BT of \pounds 30,000 to help the school.



I hope by the next newsletter to tell you all the work is complete and you too can enjoy faster more reliable broadband.

County Broadband and its contractors TELEC Networks continue to install their new underground network within the village. This work is not associated with the Openreach fibre optic project. I appreciate there has been some confusion in the village but the chaos caused around the school, pub and village hall was not caused by Openreach or BT.

THE TELEPHONE BOX

The telephone box door has been repaired and re-hung. The defibrillator has now been fitted into the telephone box and BT are organising the reconnection of the electricity supply. Once the electricity is on, the defibrillator will be able to be used.

We are seeking your help for the following: -

- 1. Repainting the telephone box. (We have the paint and will even supply the brushes.)
- 2. A small group of volunteers to check the telephone box and defibrillator on a regular basis and keeping it clean and tidy.

THE PLAYING FIELDS

If you have walked through the playing field recently you will see there is some work being carried out.

The old swings which were condemned following a survey last year are being replaced by two kid's swings and an infant's swinging basket.

The new play equipment should be installed within the next 6 weeks. The old swing and base are being removed.

A general tidy up of the trees and boundary is in progress and will be completed over the next 4 weeks.

Here we are seeking further help for the following -

- 1. A small group of volunteers to walk through the playing field (possibly whilst walking their dogs) and visibly check the area and play equipment for any potential problems.
- 2. A work party in the autumn to help tidy up the playing field.

Environment and Ecology News

Did you know that on average we use 169 litres of water per person per day in East Anglia. This coupled with East Anglia being the driest region in the UK, puts significant pressure on water resources. When was the last time you consciously thought about how much water you were using?

It only takes a few small changes to your daily routine to make LARGE savings to your water usage.

Here are Ten top tips for saving water:

- 1. Turn the tap off when brushing your teeth This can save around 24 litres of water a day.
- 2. Take shorter showers 9 litres of water is used every minute you are in the shower, while baths use around 115 litres of water.
- *3. Fill up a jug of water and keep it in the fridge this saves running the tap waiting for it to go cold.*
- 4. Use a washing up bowl just running the tap can use 8 12 litres of water a minute.
- 5. Use a bucket and sponge to wash the car running a hosepipe for a minute can use 150 litres of water.
- 6. Water harvesting use a water butt to collect rainwater in the garden, this water can then be used to water your plants and vegetables.
- 7. Fix dripping taps.
- 8. Report any water pipe leaks to anglianwater.co.uk.
- 9. Fill up your washing machines washing clothes accounts for around 20% of your household water consumption.
- *10.* Don't tip your left over water bottle water down the sink use it to fill the kettle or water plants.

Not only will using water wisely help keep water in our environment allowing plants and animals to thrive, it will help you save money on your water bill. Let use water wisely!
