

From the Parish Council



As we welcome the lighter days and the first signs of spring across Toppesfield and Gainsford End, we are pleased to bring you the March/April edition of your Parish Newsletter.

Spring is always a hopeful season in village life. The footpaths begin to dry, gardens stir back into life and there is a renewed sense of energy in our community. This edition reflects just that — a parish that is active, caring and looking ahead.

We have been encouraged by the enthusiasm of our young people, particularly the School Council's proposal to plant wildflowers on the playing field. Their initiative is a wonderful example of community spirit in action and of the pride our younger residents take in their surroundings. It is heartening to see them stepping forward with ideas and leadership.

You will also read honest reflections from the Village Hall Committee. Our hall remains a much-loved and well-used space, but like many rural facilities it depends entirely on volunteers. We echo the Committee's call for support — without fresh involvement its future could become uncertain. If you are able to offer time, skills or simply curiosity, please consider attending the AGM in April.

Community events continue to bring us together. The Annual Litter Pick on 18th April is a simple but powerful way to show pride in our parish, and we hope many of you will join in. There is also discussion about a possible summer fete — if this is something you would like to help with, we would be delighted to hear from you.

Behind the scenes, the Council has approved the budget and precept for the coming year and continues to monitor local matters affecting residents. As always, you are welcome to attend the public session at our monthly meetings to raise concerns or share ideas.

Village life thrives not because of grand gestures, but because of steady, collective effort — volunteers, organisers, supporters and good neighbours. Thank you to everyone who contributes in ways large and small. We wish you all a happy and productive spring.

Parish Council Information

A summary of Parish Council goings-on at the January and February meetings:

At the January meeting:

Cllr Richard van Dulken reported:

- Numbers at Wethersfield Asylum Centre remains at around 800 residents. A site visit is planned for the 20 January 2025 should councillors wish to attend.
- Braintree District Council are looking at their budget, and it is hoped the cost of the green bins will not increase next year. Around 10% of the Council Tax goes to Braintree DC and they are trying to keep their part of the council tax down.
- At present it looks like the County Council elections will take place in May 2026.

Cllr Peter Schwier reported:

- Essex County Council are improving bus services across Essex.
- Essex Highways Highlights publication has been circulated.
- Explore Parks – some parks are now offering free car parking.
- Streetlights were switched on for longer periods of time over the festive period.
- £300,000 has been allocated to the Members Highways Initiative to help with Highway issues.
- Roadside overgrown vegetation is being cut back around the county.

Other business in the January meeting included:

- Representatives from the school council gave a presentation as they would like to plant wildflowers in the bottom corner of the playing field and how they school council and the gardening club would maintain the area. The Cricket Club will be consulted regarding the size/location of the area the school would like to plant after the area has been marked out.
- The updated asset register was approved.
- The budget for 2026 / 2027 was approved.
- The Precept for 2026/ 2027 was approved and is set at £19350.

At the February meeting:

Cllr Richard van Dulken reported:

- The Local Plan was approved at Full Council on 3rd February 2026 to go forward to public consultation, and I will forward consultation details when available.
- I still have £200 from my Councillors' Community Grant for the current year, but I can carry it forward to next financial year.
- No developments at Wethersfield, and number of residents is back down to below 800.

Parish Council Information continued.

Other business in the February meeting included:

- The Annual village Litter Pick has been arranged for 18th April 2026 and Braintree District Council will be loaning the equipment.
- A provider has been approved to create new website and domain name to comply with current legislation.
- The parish councils bank account will be moved to a new provider to comply with new legislation.
- The puddle outside the village hall was reported again. However Highways will not be taking immediate action but will monitor it.
- It was asked if there is an appetite to run a summer fete for the community—this will be discussed in the March meeting.
- A letter from the school council was also received inviting Councillors to their coffee afternoons and Maggie's Museum exhibitions.

Toppesfield Village Hall – Newsletter February 2026

The new bespoke removable steps to the stage with handrails are now in place and have been complimented on by many users, making it easier and safer to get on & off the stage, it now feels like they have been there for ever!

Sadly due to illness and a much depleted committee along with our own personal problems, plans to our hall mentioned in previous newsletters have not been actioned including replacing our dilapidated shed, and air cooling for the hall during higher summer temperatures.

The key safe has proved useful despite a few teething problems. The code is known to our regular hirers and advised to new occasional hirers once booking forms etc. are completed. Thankfully all hirers so far have remembered to place key back into the key safe. We also now have our own mail post box on the side wall for mail addressed to the hall, pre-school and the parish council.

Bookings continue to be steady, especially popular for children's parties, along with the usual big village events. A 2025/2026 New Year party for the village proved a big success which was great to see this return as previously was a regular event. Strange how 'fashions' come and go.

Hirers intending to sell alcohol must obtain a licence before the event which can take a few weeks to action via the local council at the hirer's expense. However the use of the hall for events where users can bring their own food and drinks is again proving popular and avoids the expense and hassle.

We are a managing committee now of only 4 people and currently have no Chairman or Secretary. This is putting the future of the hall as a community venue in jeopardy. As a registered charity regulations are ever increasing and with reduced committee members this causes problems in keeping your village hall run independently as it should be by the management committees. In the next village this has happened, their hall is now run by their Parish Council, but some other problems are apparent and another burden on their councillors.



Toppesfield Village Hall – Newsletter February 2026 continued

Our hall is owned by the Toppesfield Parish Council, who have now taken up the responsibility of insuring the building itself, which includes ensuring it is electrically safe. The problems of getting volunteers for a management committee was discussed briefly by the parish council and the general view was if the PC have to take over the 'management' that it would not be willing to do so. So as to the future I really don't know what would happen.

Our thriving Pre-School is a great asset to the community along with its after school club, helping to feed children into our primary school. However it is appreciated that as it uses the hall for the majority of the week during term times, which is great for our finances, but it does prevent the opportunity for groups being able to hire it out, during the day-time and leads to less interest in the hall generally. Historically this has arisen because no other groups have returned after Covid, along with Government pressure to offer increased nursery hours via funding and so puts us into a 'Catch 22' situation.

As a long standing volunteer committee member as Treasurer, I am now responsible for the bookings, invoicing, banking, setting the heating via an App, arranging and recording meetings, arranging contacts for cleaning, gardening and maintenance, charity commission communication, local council health and safety requirements and the newsletter. Others deal with purchasing supplies, and a variety of other things needed to keep the hall functioning, and keeping me in order so Thank You ladies. However I am losing my 'mojo' and know I am not supporting the committee as well as I should. I am debating if continuing is in my best interest and/or for the good of the hall.

Our Annual General meeting is taking place on April 16th at 7pm and we are desperately hoping we can attract some more volunteers to join our committee.



Toppesfield Allotments news

Welcome to the new Toppesfield Allotments' Spring News Letter.

The allotments are a fabulous asset to this village along with the community orchard.

Please try to utilise the free fruit when in season, and don't forget we have the best wild Blackberries in Essex on the perimeter hedges.

Spring on the Allotment:

Paul Thompson's practical, guide to the 'Season of Renewal'

Spring on the allotment plot is a bit like opening the first page of a brand new notebook. Everything feels possible. The soil wakes up, daylight stretches its limbs, and suddenly the plot that looked sleepy in winter becomes a hive of potential. If you want to make the most of this energetic season, a little planning and timely action go a long way.

Below is a rich, practical guide to help you navigate spring on your allotment with confidence and creativity.

Early Spring (March): Prepare, Plan, and Wake Up the Soil Tidy and Repair

- Clear away winter debris, dead plant material, and any lingering weeds.
- Check structures: mend broken beds, repair netting, tighten greenhouse bolts, and replace damaged canes.
- Clean tools and sharpen blades to make the season smoother.

Soil Preparation

- Warm the soil by covering beds with fleece or black plastic for a couple of weeks.
- Add organic matter such as compost or well-rotted manure to replenish nutrients.
- Avoid digging when the soil is waterlogged; wait until it crumbles rather than clumps.

Early Sowing (Under Cover)

- Start hardy crops indoors or in a greenhouse:
- Broad beans
- Peas
- Lettuce
- Brassicas (cabbage, kale, broccoli)
- Leeks
- Onions from seed
- Potatoes can be chitted (sprouted) in a cool, bright place.

Mid Spring (April): Planting, Sowing, and Momentum

Direct Sowing Outdoors

Once the soil warms, you can sow:

- Carrots
- Parsnips
- Beetroot
- Spinach
- Radishes
- Spring onions

Use fleece to protect young seedlings from cold snaps or hungry pigeons.

Plant Potatoes

- First earlies go in early April.
- Second earlies and maincrop varieties follow later in the month.
- Plant in trenches with compost and earth up as shoots appear.

Plant Out Hardy Crops

- Broad beans started earlier can be planted out.
- Onion sets and shallots can go into well-prepared beds.

Tend Perennials

- Divide rhubarb crowns if needed.
- Remove dead foliage from strawberries and mulch around plants.
- Feed fruit bushes with a slow-release fertiliser.

Plant Tender Crops (After Frost Risk Passes)

Once nights are reliably mild:

- Tomatoes
- Courgettes
- Squash
- Sweetcorn
- French and runner beans

Harden off seedlings for a week before planting them out.

Spring is peak slug and snail season.

- Use organic pellets, beer traps, copper tape, or wildlife-friendly methods.
- Check under pots, boards, and damp corners.

Weeds surge in spring. Stay on top of them with:

- Regular hoeing on dry days
- Mulching around young plants
- Cardboard layers under compost in unused areas

Watering Routine

- Water deeply rather than frequently to encourage strong root systems.
- Collect rainwater—spring showers are your friend.

Plan Crop Rotation

Helps prevent disease and keeps soil nutrients balanced.

Create Wildlife Havens

- Leave a corner wild.
- Add a small pond or water dish.
- Plant pollinator-friendly flowers like calendula, borage, and nasturtiums.

Track sowing dates, successes, failures, and weather patterns. It becomes gold dust in future seasons.

Spring on the allotment is a season of optimism. Every seed you sow is a small act of faith, and every job you tick off now sets the stage for abundant summer harvests. Embrace the rhythm of the season, enjoy the fresh air, and let your Toppesfield plot become a place of creativity and calm.

Please try to have some sort of water butt system on your plot to try to keep the water charges down.

If you have a rat infestation please try to avoid areas that they can live such as under sheds and roofing sheets on the ground, we have noticed a few rat runs around the plots .

All visitors to the site with dogs - We are still finding Poo left by owners!

This is totally unacceptable situation as we have many children visiting the site - potential CCTV will be employed to find the culprits.

It is also not acceptable to let your dog foul the Parish Footpaths and The Playing Fields.

All plot owners please pay your subscription as soon as the contract is sent to you.
