Finally, thanks to everyone who has contributed to this issue; we always welcome articles, photos, stories. Despite the lack of activities over recent weeks we still have a pretty full edition this month.

TOPPESFIELD Community Shop

opened in October 2002 so is almost eighteen years old.

What an achievement. But why did we open a community shop?

The Toppesfield Community Shop story really began with the sudden closure in Spring 2001 of the post office and shop.



I came to live in Gainsford End in 1966 and at that time there were three pubs and three shops in the parish. The Wheatsheaf pub in Gainsford End was open and had a very small shop on the side. The Green Man was open as was The Chestnut and Alf's shop and Mrs Claxton's shop and post office. There were even sundry vans calling every day. Gibson the butcher from Wethersfield delivered twice a week and even a fish and chip van stopped at The Wheatsheaf in Gainsford End at midday on a Monday. Also, buses every day to Haverhill or Braintree or Halstead. In addition to this public transport the train station at Gt. Yeldham had only just closed.

Over the years the shops had always been part of someone's house so when they moved or retired there was always the problem of the continuation of the shop and post office. When, in 2001 this situation arose, an action group, initiated by the Parish Council, set about building the shop. Amazingly in just sixteen months the planning permission had been approved, money raised, shop built and open. During this time a portakabin had been placed in front of The Chestnut and provided shopping facilities. This was run by Ivy Ogborn who of course is still a very valued volunteer at the shop.

As the years rolled on we expanded the range of goods we kept and wherever possible tried to source our stock locally. This is still the mantra of the shop. At this time the Post Office was open full time weekdays. Unfortunately in 2008 the post office went through a rather unstable time and in June 2009 we were delighted to welcome Trevor Cooper as our new postmaster assisted by Keely Clark. Even Postman Pat was at the celebration!

In 2012 we celebrated our 10th anniversary with a party in the village hall attended by customers, volunteers, shareholders and suppliers. It was a great evening. The wonderful cake was cut by Dave Dyson and Lynn Collard. We like parties and every year, in the Winter, we have a supper party for all the volunteers and in the Summer a BBQ.



The shop has always been a vital hub in the centre of the village. Not just to get your shopping or use the post office but even more important a communication point for people to meet, have a chat, support each other and offer help where required.

Particularly so at this ghastly time. The problem was that most of the volunteers are over 70 and so not able to help in the shop. A fantastic cohort of new volunteers have stepped in, been trained, so that the shop is still open and doing an amazing job. The shop has made it possible to socially isolate but still get everything you need. I say I am living in my Toppesfield Bubble and do not plan to move out of it!

While looking for photos and press cuttings relating to the shop since it first started I became aware that Dave Dyson was in most of them. The shop is a fitting tribute to Dave Dyson who sadly died a few weeks ago. Do stay safe and well and when all this is over remember your community shop and keep using it.

It is thought that the portrait was actually painted whilst the artist and Lady Plummer were staying at Berwick Hall on The Causeway in Toppesfield. It is in that fine house that the portrait has been 'on holiday' whilst we have had lots of work and painting done at the Hall.

Her vacation has caused questions, not only about when she will return, but 'where are the other photographs?' Apparently there was a photograph of Lord Sainsbury and one of Sir Leslie on the walls some years ago. No one knew where they had gone.

Back to the mouse.

In the late summer we discovered evidence of mice in a cupboard which was used to store past papers from the Parish Council and Village Hall. Suitably clad and with rubber gloves and mouse trap in hand, I embarked on a voyage of discovery. It was a village equivalent of Tutankhamun's tomb! Many interesting original papers and documents came to light, all around them and everywhere was lots of flakey paper which turned out to be aged bubble wrap from which had been made an effective mouse nest. At the bottom of all of this- well you have no doubt guessed, the photos and very handsome they are too.

We have had them reframed and are planning a celebration, both of the re-opening of the Hall and also to commemorate the hall being 60 years old in 2021. The pictures and the painting will be rehung in the hall.

Hi Everyone. I hope you are all keeping safe and well. I had planned a Bluebell Walk on Sunday 3rd May but as we will still be in lock down this won't be happening. However, we are so lucky living where we do that, we can still enjoy our gardens and footpaths. I go for a walk every day, as I am sure many of you do and of course the amazing weather and dry conditions has made this a real pleasure.

A few days ago, I just set off down Stambourne Rd to then go down to Gunces and back up to Church lane. It was just a guide to the countryside. Five deer crossed the road in front of me and then on the stretch down to Gunces I heard Chiff Chaff, blackbirds, Great Tit, blue tit, wren, dunnock. Then to top the chorus I heard and saw a skylark, just magic. I am not particularly good on bird song but these are the ones I could identify! Sadly, on this walk I came across a dead badger.

The verges are now a carpet of colour with dandelions, daisies, white dead nettle, Red dead nettle, cowslips, ground ivy, groundsel, buttercups, stitchwort and the hedge parsley coming into bloom. Also, Berwick Hall Wood is a carpet of bluebells and perfume is quite overpowering. Let's not forget the trees at this time as leaves unfurl and flowers develop.

Of course, with the flowers and leaves will come the insects, the bees, flies and butterflies. Again along that stretch I saw peacock, orange tip, small white, holly blue, small tortoiseshell and brimstone butterflies. Again, just a wonderful sight.

When I am out on my walks I forget about the awful situation we are in. Luckily nature isn't aware of the lock down! So do enjoy your walks and make the most of the things going on around you and the beautiful place we live.

Why not keep a log of what you see and hear when you are out on your walks or in the garden? You could always add some drawings or paintings and perhaps some information about the things you have seen and heard. If they are insects what are they eating? If butterflies what flowers do they like to feed on. If Summer visiting birds like swallows, house martins, swifts and cuckoos where have they flown from. Perhaps include a map of the world showing these migratory routes. You could add a symbol for the weather on that day or write a poem, create a story or write about how the lockdown is making you feel. The ideas are endless. You never know we might have this as a class in the Village Show or as an exhibition in the celebrations I am sure we will have when this coronavirus is all over.

We are very happy to deliver wine locally on a free of charge basis for anyone who is self isolating – just call us on 07768 817573 or drop us an email to info@toppesfieldvineyard.co.uk. Alternatively, you can collect from the Wine Centre if we pre-arrange a collection time and we maintain the Government’s social distancing guidelines.

Harrow Hill is a great place to be isolated. Lockdown has created a fantastic community spirit. Thanks to Jac, David and Daisy at Harrow Hill Community for the nightly ‘Dance Off’ – they now have followers all across the world. We have a community clap and whistle for the NHS on a Thursday evening, fantastic egg supplies (until the fox made a couple of unwelcome visits this week); plant swapping, neighbourhood quizzes and bee alerts, excellent communal shopping and beautiful scenery. The Prince's Countryside Fund is covering the Covid-19 responses of its beneficiaries. Here is its article about Pumphouse.

'Pumphouse Brewery Coronavirus Response

Richard, a member of the Management Committee said: "When Covid-19 measures were introduced, the impact on Pumphouse was immediate, substantial and potentially catastrophic. Overnight our core markets of pubs, venues and events simply disappeared. All that remained were the few retailers allowed to remain open and our neighbours in the local community.

"Our response has been to reduce production and furlough one person, but crucially to keep on brewing. We are producing small quantities for home deliveries of draft beer in two and four pint containers and larger volumes are being bottled. Bottled beer has a longer shelf life and we are building stocks of a wide range of ales for sale during the emergency and for the future.

"The Prince's Countryside Fund have very kindly given us permission to repurpose some grant money to buy new bottling equipment, shelving and, importantly, an EPOS system so we can make all transactions cashless.

"We are introducing special friendly pricing for the duration of the emergency, so our neighbours and regular customers can buy our locally produced beers for supermarket prices. We won't make a profit, but Pumphouse can keep on working and keep on supporting our community."
