From the Parish Council



Welcome to the latest Toppesfield & Gainsford End Newsletter.

After a couple of years during which so many events have been cancelled due to lockdowns, you will see this month that we again have a lot of attractive things to look forward to.

In addition to the village market on the first Saturday each month, the Allotments society has arranged a trip to the Suffolk Show at the end of May, the 'Red Hot Ukes' are re-launching after 2 years of covid-enforced inactivity, 'Happy's Circus' will be performing in the village on 19 June to raise funds for the village pre-school (to whom congratulations are due on their 'Good' rating from OFSTED) and Ann Read is giving an early notice of the Toppesfield Village show to be held in September.

But, of course, the BIG event of the year will be the Jubilee celebrations between 2nd and 5th June. There is a notice in this Newsletter setting out the range of activities that are being planned and you will see that there will be a lot going on, from the picnic and beacon lighting on Thursday 2nd through to the special service at St Margaret's on Sunday, followed by a community lunch at the village hall and its grounds. In the Newsletter you will find a packet of wildflower seeds. We would like each household to plant these so that we can have a continuing reminder of the event around the parish.

This jubilee is an historic one; no other British monarch has reigned for as long and this is an event that quite probably will never be repeated.

So please join in – this is for the whole parish and everyone is welcome. We would love to see all of you at as many of the events as possible!

One institution that is integral to events such as the Jubilee is, of course, The Green Man. On Saturday 4th June, the Jubilee event will be centred on our community owned pub and for those of you who have not yet met them, it will be an opportunity for you to get to know the new tenants, Kevin and Janet who became part of our community at the end of March. We wish them every success at the Green Man.

Over the past two months it has been impossible to avoid the terrible events that have unfolded in Ukraine. It is so difficult for us to even imagine how one's life can be upturned so suddenly and violently. The UK government has established a Homes for Ukraine scheme offering safe homes for some of the many who have had to leave the country. Revd. Liz Paxton, the Rector of the Hedinghams and Upper Colne Benefice, and her husband, Garry, have been involved in delivering aid to Ukraine for many years and through a long-term friend there, Liz and Garry have arranged for 13 families to be hosted by families in the Benefice area. Two of these families are now based in Toppesfield and you will see them around the parish. I am sure that everyone will give them a warm welcome. Certainly, the blue and yellow flag prominently displayed on the church lychgate will be a good indication of how we are pleased to see them. More host families are being sought for Ukrainians seeking to leave the country. Finally, Boyd Page has stepped down as a Parish Councillor at the April meeting. We are disappointed to lose Boyd as a colleague. He has been extremely active in supporting the council's activities and helping to make the parish an attractive and sustainable community.

Parish Council Information

A short summary of Parish Council goings-on at the March and April Meetings:

In March, Braintree District Councillor Richard van Dulken reported:

- There will be a public consultation regarding proposed council boundary changes
 - A "Men's Shed" is to be installed in Great Yeldham
 - BDC Planning Enforcement is to be strengthened
 - North BDC has been identified as a deprived area in the Levelling Up White Paper issued by Essex County Council and he is asking local Parishes for ideas on what can be done.
 - At the request of residents in Mallows Lane, Gainsford End, the PC is obtaining quotes for a road sign to indicate that turning is restricted in Mallows Lane. Apparently, there have been several instances of delivery =vans becoming stranded.
 - A letter will be sent to residents of Dordell Court detailing who to contact if there is a damp problem.
 - There will be a review of recreational facilities in the village.
 - A coffee morning will be held on March 26th.
 - A litter pick will be held on April 9th
 - The June PC meeting will be on the 9th not the 2nd.
 - The Gainsford End Village signs near Woodleys Cottage and the Noticeboard in Gainsford End will be repaired shortly.

In April Cllr Schwier (ECC) reported:

- Over 1000 trees came down and were dealt with during the recent storm.
- The Council is focusing on arrivals of refugees from Ukaraine.
- He has funding available for P[arish projects and is seeking applications.
- After a discussion regarding play equipment for younger children at Gainsford End Recreation area, it was agreed that this should be part of the review planned for Toppesfield. However, as this may delay any immediate installations, it was agreed that 6' x 4' football nets with plastic frames will be purchased for Gainsford End.
- The Neighbourhood Plan is proceeding.
- Plans for village Platinum Jubilee celebrations are continuing.
- It was agreed to increase the Clerk's remuneration and to backdate the increase in line with NALC Guidelines.
- June 13th to 17th is Loneliness Awareness Week and Community360 are running a Road Show around villages in the Braintree District. The aim of the Road Show is to engage with as many people as possible who may suffer from isolation & loneliness to point them to agencies and clubs who can help them. It was agreed that the road show would come to Toppesfield.
- The PC was notified of 5 planning applications, one of which was for information only. The PC was supportive of the other 4 with a reservation regarding traffic and parking noted about the proposed new health centre in Sible Hedingham.

The Parish Council meets on the first Thursday of each month at 7.30PM. Residents are encouraged to bring any issues for discussion to the meeting, the first 15 minutes of which are a public meeting.

News from the Footpaths



Hi Everyone

I hope you are all well and enjoying your walking. Looking back at last year's May edition of the newsletter we were in the initial stages of getting the first covid vaccination and now we are into the fourth and I suspect a lot of you have had covid but hopefully not too seriously.

Thankfully as the land has dried up and many of the cross field foot paths have been marked out we can now explore the footpaths again. I think my theme for this time of the year has to be yellow. It starts ,of course, with the sun and then the first yellow flowers to appear are aconites shortly followed by celandines . Then the

primroses and daffodils and now the cowslips, dandelions and later the buttercups. I always think dandelions are much maligned and certainly they are a bit of a pest in the garden but oh the colour and they provide a very nutritious feast for butterflies, bees and other insects and who can resist blowing the clock in the Autumn? Also the leaves are very palatable. The tortoises love the leaves and the flowers and did you know that during war the roots were ground up to make coffee. Still on the theme of yellow of course the rape is just coming into flower making the countryside almost glow. I do hope not too many of you are suffering from the pollen.





In the last issue of the newsletter I included a photograph of the snowdrops in the churchyard. Now it is a carpet of primroses, both yellow and pink mixed in with the dainty purple and white violets and the odd buttercup putting in an appearance. Do take a look. It is just magical.

The Blackthorn blossom is just beginning to go over but has been just like white foam decorating the hedgerows. I just hope a late frost doesn't damage the flowers so that there is a good harvest of sloes in the Autumn.

The birds at this time are frantically busy making their nests and rearing their young.



The bird song is such a delight. I was listening to a robin the other day and couldn't believe that such a terrific sound could come from such a small bird. This is only outdone by the Wren often called the little bird with the big voice. I am looking forward to hearing the first cuckoo, a sure sign that Spring has arrived. Also another positive sign is that the tortoises have woken up!

I have kept reporting the dangerous condition of the bridge over the brook at the back of Ollivers and today, finally, have heard **that it has been inspected and is to be repaired in the next ten days.** Do take care if you are walking that way before it is repaired.



Toppesfield and Gainsford End Village Show 2022



THE JUBILEE ORCHARD

On Sunday 24 th April the long planned orchard trees were planted in the 2.5 acre field to the west of The Causeway, between The Old Rectory and Jasmine House. The trees were supplied by Grow at Brogdale, and the Managing Director Brian Cooper and four of his staff planted the trees in the holes dug earlier in the year. Grow at Brogdale is associated with Brogdale, of Faversham Kent, which holds the National Collection of Fruit Trees. The plan for the 104-tree orchard is to have a mixed selection of apple, pear, plum, gage, cherry, quince and crab varieties, which will give successive blossoming and fruiting. Many of the trees are of heritage varieties, creating rare fruits and interesting historical information.

The trees are planted in sectors, separated by avenues radiating from a central analemmatic sundial, to allow the shadows at the equinoxes to fall along the avenues at 2-hourly intervals. The shadow points were marked in March 2022, whilst the hourly mid-summer points were marked in 2021. These measurements enable us to plot the elevation of the sun during the day and in different seasons.

That is our plan, so with much TLC it will be exciting to watch progress. We would be very happy to talk to anyone about the project.



Wethersfield Airfield Prison Proposal Update

WASC is a collaboration of Parish Councils that have come together to oppose the plans, as they currently stand, for the mega prisons complex proposed for Wethersfield Airbase. WASC has been formed under the Local Government Act 1972 Section 102 which allows two or more local authorities to come together to form a committee to discharge their function. WASC currently comprises of 12 Parish Councils - Shalford, Wethersfield, Finchingfield, Sible Hedingham, Toppesfield, Great Bardfield, The Salings, Little Bardfield, Panfield, Castle Hedingham, Gosfield and Great Yeldham. Each PC has officially discussed and then appointed representatives at their own PC meetings.

WASC has a technical sub-committee which is spearheading the opposition to the proposals. This sub-committee comprises a range of people, volunteering their time, who have relevant professional skills and is chaired by a Wethersfield councillor with over 40 years-experience as a senior planner in Local Government. To provide the most robust opposition to the plans a long and extensive work schedule has been underway since October. However, there is a huge amount to do and WASC are currently engaging with expert consultants on the following areas - landscape, heritage, ecology, transport/highways etc.

Information, meeting minutes, etc. can be found at <u>WASC – Wethersfield Parish Council (wethersfield-pc.gov.uk)</u>.

Some of the Parish Councils have been able to commit funds to WASC so they are able to engage with the above consultants, however, there is a funding shortfall and we need the help of local residents to help fight this battle effectively.

Which leads on to the role of SWAP...

SWAP Stop Wethersfield Airfield Prisons is a campaign group being led by The Fields Association. This is a residents led campaign group, all of whom live locally and are volunteering their time tirelessly. Their primary objectives are 1) to promote and preserve the beauty of the North Essex countryside 2) to help raise public awareness of the prisons proposal 3) to help raise funds to help WASC engage professional firms to fight the proposals 4) to consult with the local community to include their ideas for alternative uses.

So, WASC is the Parish Council led, technical response to the proposals, responsible for responding to any application with detailed expert analysis, and SWAP is the resident- led group looking to raise public awareness and raise funds to help WASC in its task of fighting these proposals.

The Fields Association website is up and running www.thefieldsassociation.org and you can join the association through the website. Please explore the website and use the contact button to get in touch with the SWAP team. The core team is only 20 people, so please volunteer if you can help!

SWAP has distributed a leaflet to every household within the 12 parishes that currently make up WASC as many It seems that few people really appreciate the size and brutal architecture of the proposed mega prisons nor the impact it will have on the surrounding area.

The SWAP team have also been engaging Braintree District Council, asking questions at the full council meetings. These sessions are available to view on YouTube (search Braintree District council). All questions are taken early in the meetings, so you don't have to watch for hours!

The latest headline news is that CPRE (Campaign to Protect Rural England) has issued at statement the message of which is "CPRE's preference would be for the airfield to be returned to the use it had before the Second World War, *ie* agricultural purposes – especially as it lies surrounded by Grade 2 (very good quality) land. Alternatively, if the cost of reinstatement is prohibitive, a mixed-use country park and leisure scheme might be appropriate". CPRE does not consider the airbase to be a Brownfield Site. In addition, Braintree District Council (BDC) has responded in great detail to the Ministry of Justice (MOJ) Environmental Assessment Scoping Request. This request proposed how the Environmental Assessment would be done and what it would cover. The response notes in many areas that the MoJ Scoping Request is not sufficiently detailed or that assumptions are unacceptable. One specific issue is that of air quality measurement and the establishing of a baseline. The MoJ will be required to measure air quality in the vicinity of the Airbase in order to establish a baseline. This could take 6 months and possibly delay a planning application.

Furthermore, both WASC and SWAP have met representatives of the DIO, and the deadline for disposal of 2025 has been confirmed. Any delays in planning applications will therefore be of concern.



Home Essentials from BT

It has been brought to the attention of the Parish Council that BT have broadband and phone packages that could benefit people who are in receipt of certain benefits.

Here is some basic information about this service taken from some of their literature.

What our BT's Home Essentials plan?

Our Home Essentials plan is a reliable and affordable way for people on specific state benefits, including Universal Credit and Pension Credit (Guarantee Credit), to have a low-cost broadband and phone package. You can choose broadband with a phone line, or just the phone line by itself. And if you go for the broadband and phone line option, there are a couple of plans to choose from.

Who can get the Home Essentials plan?

BT Home Essentials is available for anyone on one or more of these benefits: • Universal Credit • Pension Credit (Guarantee Credit) • Income Support • Jobseeker's Allowance† • Employment and Support Allowance. † (Certain Criteria apply to Jobseekers Allowance and Employment and Support Allowance.)

How do I get it?

Here's how: 1. Get in touch with us - • Go to our website at bt.com/home-essentials • You can call us on 0800 800 150

- 2. You'll need to tell us your surname, date of birth, and National Insurance number.
- 3. We'll run an instant check to make sure you're eligible for Home Essentials.
- 4. If you are, we'll connect you as soon as we can.

There are some copies of the leaflet in the shop which will give you more information regarding pricing and plans, however the most up to date information will come straight from contacting BT themselves.

Other service providers may have similar offers but the parish council are not aware of these so it may be worth getting into with your provider to check if they do.

Wildlife Ponds - Funding Available!

Ponds are a cherished part of the parish landscape; familiar historic features found at the heart of most village centres and in the wider countryside. Sadly, due to changes in land use and agricultural practices, the UK has lost around 50% of ponds in the 20th Century. Those remaining are often threatened by pollution. This means the many species of plant and animal that rely on them are also under threat.


Excitingly, funding is now available in certain parts of Essex for the restoration and creation of clean water wildlife ponds capable of supporting great crested newts. The funding is part of Natural England's District Level Licencing scheme (DLL), a new strategy for compensating the loss of newt habitats, which seeks to provide new ponds and bigger, better, more joined-up habitat for this orange-bellied amphibian at a landscape scale.

In Essex there is a high demand for such wildlife ponds through the DLL scheme. Most of the 150 or so pond projects we have delivered to date have been fully funded under the scheme. You can view some of these projects at: www.fwageast.org.uk/ponds.

We are seeking local farmers, smallholders, large rural garden owners, land-based businesses and parish -owned land to create and restore more such ponds.
