News from St Margaret's Parish Church

Thank you to everyone who made our Harvest Festival so special, and to David and Paul who hosted a wonderful Harvest Supper afterwards in a packed Green Man.

We're delighted to welcome Rev Justin Tomkins to our benefice. He was appointed earlier this month and will help Rev Liz, especially in the Yeldham parishes, where he will live with his wife Dalena and their children. Rules about gravestones and memorials in the churchyard

In July this year The Diocese of Chelmsford published an updated version of its Churchyard Handbook which sets out guidelines and regulations regarding all aspects of country churchyards, ranging from maintenance, design of gravestones and obtaining consent for them, flowers (fresh please, not artificial), reserving grave spaces to burial of cremated remains, to name but a few.

It is extremely comprehensive and easy to absorb. We have left a copy inside the church on the small table at the back of the pews so that anyone can read it should the need arise. We strongly recommend that it should be consulted before ordering expensive items such as gravestones or memorials to ensure that they are in accordance with the stipulations laid down in the handbook.

WHEN 5 BECAME 8

Standing high on the crest of a hill (287 ft.) overlooking the Colne River Valley, Toppesfield Church is dedicated to St. Margaret of Antioch.

St. Margaret's is one of the many stories of virgins martyred after spurning the advances of wicked Roman officials. Because of her refusal and her Christian faith, the provost Olybrius had her tortured. At the end of the first day of torments, she is thrown into prison and assailed by a demon in the shape of a dragon, from whom she saves herself by making the sign of the cross. The following day, after yet more tortures, the heavens open and St. Margaret is granted a crown, a sight which leads 5000 pagans to convert. Olybrius finally puts an end to these affronts by having her beheaded.

The tower of red brick, is of unusual design and has arched windows and battlements with obelisk pinnacles at each corner. A distinguishing feature is the semi-circle troughs between the battlements.

At sometime in the past, there were obelisks in the centre of these troughs but these have now been removed. A tablet in the west wall of the tower tells us that the bricklayer was a Daniel Hill, who erected it in 1699, the former tower of flint and rubble having collapsed on the night of 4th July, 1689. When making slots for the new metal frame to fit into the new rebuilt brick tower, it was discovered that between the inner wall and the outer wall, rubble from the old tower which had collapsed, had been tipped in between to infill the space. It is quite possible, that some of the old flint and rubble tower, is still standing inside the walls of the red brick tower.

CHURCH BELLS HISTORY

The oldest bells in the tower are the second, third and fourth bells cast in 1675 by Antony Bartlet of Whitechapel. His initials first appeared on a bell in Lambourne, Essex in 1640 and his latest know castings are the three at Toppesfield. The fourth treble bell was cast by Henry Pleasant of Sudbury in 1702 and the tenor bell cast by Pack and Chapman in 1779.

Campaigning to augment a ring of five to eight, lower down the tower and in a metal frame, culminated in a very serious period of planning. Four of the old bells were taken to TES Ltd - Taylors Eayre and Smith, the bell founders of Loughborough, for re-welding and re-tuning with four new bells cast at the foundry, three new trebles and a brand new tenor. The old tenor, which was too badly damaged for repair, was left at the top of the tower in its original position. We were also given a bell for the church clock by the church diocese which, interestingly, is a bell cast by Thomas Bartlet in 1617, the father of Antony, who cast our three trebles in 1675. The old wooden frame, probably dates from the middle to the late 19th century and was likely to have been made by a local carpenter. This frame is to remain in its original position with the old tenor.

After seven years of Concerts, Supper Evenings, Barbecues and many other smaller events, which all helped to get four bells repaired and four new bells installed, Toppesfield bells finally came to life on January 19th 2008 when a Dedication and Thanksgiving Service was held. It was conducted by the Bishop of Chelmsford, the Rt. Revd. John Gladwin who, during the service, blessed the tower, the new ringing chamber and the bells old and new. The school children from St. Margaret's, were very much involved in the project, searching out some of its history, learning to ring hand bells and in some cases showing and interest in learning to ring church tower bells.

Since the augmentation of the new bells and ringing chamber, we have had very little interest in this ancient art of bell ringing. It is a hobby, which can take time to learn but if anyone is interested and would like to have a go, our practice night is on a Wednesday from 7.30pm until 9.00pm.

The committee liaises with the tenant, in this case David and Paul Wignall, to ensure that the best outcomes are achieved for customers, tenant and landlord, though the committee has no direct control over the running of the pub itself, which falls to the tenant.

United by a desire to see the Green Man remain open, flourish and serve the wider community, the members of the TCP committee bring extensive experience to the role of managing the pub on behalf of shareholders. TCP has a responsibility to act according to the rules of a Community Benefit Society, and all decisions by the committee are made with these in mind.

One of the major priorities for the committee is the refurbishment of the pub, and as such, it is actively looking to raise funds through grants or sponsorship. Currently a window replacement scheme is being undertaken, which will improve the pub's aesthetics, energy efficiency and overall comfort for customers and tenants. We have already raised over £2000 with donations from shareholders and The Red Barrows.

We had another boost to our window fund lately with £500 being donated by the audience and diners in the pub who were there to see the Red Barrows band Reptile Dysfunction perform and enjoy a Thai curry on Saturday 12th October. A very big thank you to all.

We rely on volunteers to help out wherever possible and would like to say a big thank you to Bernie Stevenson and everyone else who turned up to paint the pub the other weekend. It was a great team effort and I am sure you will agree that the pub now looks a great deal smarter.

The Toppesfield Fibre Broadband Big Build

Work to deliver full fibre broadband to Toppesfield is ongoing by Openreach with underground ducting work now complete in Harrow Hill (pictured), Camoise Close and Great Yeldham Road along with new poles installed in Church lane, work can soon move to installing new fibre cabling and hardware ready to connect residents to Ultrafast Broadband speeds amongst the fastest in the UK.

A choice of service providers will be available including BT, Sky, Freeola, Spectrum and Zen. Freeola is a local company based in Braintree.

Gainsford End residents are already enjoying the benefits the increased Broadband speeds bring.

It was also good to see a fair few supporters in attendance, enjoying the splendid cakes on offer courtesy of the Muckies. Some money was raised, some beer was drunk and a good time was had by all. Cricket – what's not to like?

Tommo's tips

No time to rest. There is just enough daylight to clear and tidy up the allotment of any old crops in preparation for next year. Don't leave the remains of summer crops to rot and harbour overwintering pests and diseases. Wait for a clear, crisp, sunny day and go for it. You'll feel shattered but a lot better at the end of the exercise.

Start to harvest winter cabbage, Brussels sprouts, leeks and parsnips, wait until after a frost for the parsnips because the chilling effect turns the starches into sugars and this gives them their natural sweetness. Pick the Brussels sprouts working from the bottom of the stalk upwards to make sure that all of the sprouts get a chance to swell. At the same time snap off any yellowing leaves at their base to ensure that there is good air circulation around the plants. It also makes the sprouts easier to pick on a cold, wet and frosty day.

Dog walkers are always welcome, but remember we have Poo bins at the pathway.

Also it is unacceptable to leave dog mess in the middle of any public pathway in the parish.

If you could please flick it into the side that would be an improvement.

Please be a good responsible owner. It's not the dogs at fault!


