Parish Council Information

• A summary of Parish Council goings-on at the September and October Meetings: Full details can be found in the minutes for the meeting on the parish website.

In August Councillor van Dulken reported:

- There is now a Foodbank in Sible Hedingham Baptist Church. This is open on a Tuesday form 2pm 4pm. People need to be referred in order to be able to use the service.
- That he and District Cllr Iona Parker along with Councillors from Bulmer and Ridgewell are keen on getting a bus from Hedingham to Haverhill. There is a consultation on Essex County Council's website and is open for comments until the 5th October 2023.
- Wethersfield some of Richard's colleagues attended a tour of the site and were impressed by the set up and they had the opportunity to talk to some of the residents. Braintree District Council still feel that it is the wrong place for the asylum centre. Permission was granted for a Judicial review hearing which will be held on 30th and 31st October 2023.
- Cllr van Dulken mentioned the Environmental Impact Assessment application to Great Yeldham Parish Council.
- The garden waste collection will be chargeable from next year bur for residents who sign up before the 30th November 2023 there will be an early bird discount of 50%. New arrangements will start in March 2024.
- The Councillors Community Grant is not available for Toppesfield Community Club as their shareholders receive interest payments.

Highlights from the September meeting were:

- During the public meeting concerns were raised regarding the speed of vehicles through the village and a possible Environmental Impact Assessment survey through the village on land next to Toppesfield Hall.
- There was an offer from a working party to landscape the pétanque court area Many thanks to the working party who have been working on this.
- The Christmas event on the 2nd December is being organised.
- There is a damaged slide in Toppesfield playing field quotes are being sought to address this.
- Posters and Facebook posts have been published to see if there in an interest in setting up a Neighbourhood Watch group in the parish - if interested please contact the parish clerk.

In October Councillor van Dulken sent in his report as below:

 As of 2 weeks ago, 9006 households in Braintree District (out of about 54,000 which have collections) have subscribed to the early bird rate for garden waste collection from April 2024. This is a greater initial indication of interest than anticipated.

Parish Council Information continued

- I note that Braintree Planning Department has indicated that it would require an
 Environmental Impact Study in the event that a planning application is submitted for a
 solar farm at Toppesfield Hall.
- Community Grants please let me know if there are any areas where a grant could be useful, as I have a reasonable balance left.
- Devolution you may have heard this being mentioned. In Essex, Essex County Council, Southend Borough Council, Thurrock, the District and Borough Councils plus the Police, Fire and Rescue Commissioner are seeking to set up and be part of a new institution to be known as a Combined Authority, which will take collective decisions on the powers and budgets which the government devolves down to Greater Essex under such a deal. This would NOT be a merger each authority would remain independent and retain its separate budgets and operations. There would not be a Mayor for Essex as in other areas of the country, but residents and businesses would benefit from additional funding and from coordination of the authorities within Greater Essex.
- 309 fly tips were cleared within 24 hours during the period 1st April to 30th June.
- There is a public consultation being carried out by Essex County Council (ECC) regarding the future of Recycling Centre bookings, this is an opportunity for members of the public to have their say on the current appointment-based system and all feedback will be used to help determine whether or not this should become a permanent arrangement. ECC will publish a summary report of the consultation feedback after the consultation is complete and responses have been analysed. The consultation runs from the 9th October until the 19th November 2023. Please see the following link for further details http://www.essex.gov.uk/recyclingcentrebookings
- The Medical Centre in Sible is still slowly progressing.

Highlights from the October meeting were:

- Jan Stobart from the RCCE attended the meeting to talk through the next steps to progress the Neighbourhood Plan.
- A budget for the Christmas event was confirmed and plans are progressing.
- A quote from the original supplier of the damaged slide was received but due to the high cost other quotes will be gained.
- A quote was received and accepted to replace trees along The Causeway. It was agreed to purchase 6 trees for planting
- An outline planning application for the potential Pump project has been submitted.
- A request for a salt bin to be installed at Camoise Close has been made.
- The flooding issue from the Green Man barns to the village hall has been escalated to the Cabinet Highway lead.

News from the Footpaths



Hi Everyone

We always have to talk about the weather but in the last week we have gone from brilliant skies and really hot days to torrential rain, night frost and now gales!

I was leading a walk for the Walking for Well Being group a few weeks ago and did a recce. My plan was to walk down Harrow Hill and then up to Thurstons, along through the old church yard and back parallel to Gainsford End, down through the vineyard and back to the village. However several of the fields that the footpaths crossed had been ploughed so a bit of a no go. I did walk it but it was like scrambling over rocks! I have to say I do love to see the soil ploughed, preferably when I haven't got to walk across it!

Walking the footpaths is always difficult at this time of year, particularly where footpaths cross the cultivated fields. Our heavy clay doesn't help! I am sure that in a few weeks when the crops have grown through the footpaths will be sprayed out again.

So change of plan, I did the walk up to Blooms Farm, along the bridleway and back passed the lakes then returned to the village up Scotneys lane. It was a beautiful warm sunny day and a delightful



walk with no cultivated fields to cross! I always enjoy the walk through the bridle way with stunning views of Gt Yeldham Church and the castle at Castle Hedingham. To complete the walk there were bullaces and blackberries to forage all serenaded by the buzzards soaring overhead. There were 28 walkers and many enjoyed refreshments in the shop garden when we got back.



I am always on the look out for different things in the hedgerow and yet again came across a robin's pincushion. It appears as a fluffy ball on the wild rose bushes. It is in fact a gall caused by a gall wasp laying its eggs on the rose bush. The plant reacts by growing this gall around the eggs. In the Spring the gall wasps will emerge. Amazing.

I will again get onto highways about our broken finger posts and waymarkers.

It is very frustrating that these things do not get attended to. As usual it is lack of staff and resources.

I again am planning a New Year walk on Sunday 7th January 2024 leaving The Green Man at 10.30am. Do join me.

After all the exertions of this year, the vines will be taking it easy next year so we should be back to a normal harvest day in 2024.

TOPPESFIELD ALLOTMENTS with NASLAG

Allotment Garden Newsletter

Autumn officially started with the equinox in September. It's getting cooler and we're already building a fire in the evenings. The rain never stops for long and I could do with a good dry week to catch up on all the jobs. I know I'm not the only one feeling this way.

We are going to ask for volunteers for pre winter clear up in the coming weeks.

Can I remind people that the composting area is for compostable's and NOT Hedge trimmings which should be placed on the firepit.

Rhubarb

Remove all the dead leaves from the Rhubarb, clear the bed up and make it tidy, then fork over the soil round the crowns and apply manure. You have then finished with the bed until you want to start forcing in the spring.

Rhubarb is one of the easiest, almost indestructible perennial plants to grow. Productive and versatile too. See: A Guide to Growing Rhubarb

Parsley Tip

You may now find your spring-sown parsley running to seed, some of it in full flower. These flower stems will exhaust the plant. So your best plan is to cut down the plants almost to ground level and give them a little fertiliser and some water. By this means you can have fine parsley all through the winter.

September.

Parsley is one of my favourite herbs although some are not keen as it reminds them of school dinners with parsley sauce. It's actually very good for you being extremely high in vitamin K which is essential for blood clotting and healthy bones. It also contains vitamins C & A along with minerals

Brassica Tips

With brassicas, remove any yellowed leaves as these are of no use to the plant and will encourage diseases to develop and attract slugs.

With Brussels Sprouts, earth up a couple of inches and tread the soil firmly so winter storms don't cause wind-rock which damages the roots. In exposed sites it's worth staking the sprouts. If they do get shaken by strong winds, apply a high nitrogen liquid feed fortnightly to compensate for any root damage.

Storing Apples

It has been a good year for apples on plots and in garden's and I've had a number of questions about storing and preserving apples. You should store only sound, unbruised, firm fruit. Check them regularly as any decay or rot will quickly spread through the entire stored crop. We then wrap individual apples in newspaper and store in a box in a cool, dark, dry place.

For those bruised or damaged apples Google Apple Recipes as well as Chutney Recipes for some tasty ideas.

Victoria organised a Village Halloween trail for the children, we got into the spooky spirit and decorated the Herb Garden with Skeletons, Spiders, Skulls, banners and all things scary.

That's all for this month. Hopefully this has been useful and interesting for you.






