MALDON TO JOIN ESSEX COUNTY COUNCIL'S COMMUNITY SUPERMARKET NETWORK

Essex County Council is expanding its network of community supermarkets across the county.

The new Maldon District Social Supermarket is run by Maldon and District CVS. It will run as a pop-up shop in the United Reformed Churches in both Burnham-on-Crouch and Southminster.

The shop will provide residents with affordable cupboard essentials, toiletries and fresh food. It will run every two weeks, alternating between both of the sites. Morning and afternoon times are available are listed below. More sessions across the Maldon district will be in place over the next six months.

Burnham United Reformed Church 1pm to 2.30pm

The Social Supermarket will also be coming the Maldon District Council Offices in the Foyer on Thursday 13 March, 1pm to 2.30pm.

The official opening comes after successful pilot sessions. Feedback from local customers informed what products are stocked and to build relationships with shoppers.

Prices at the Maldon Social Supermarket will start at just £5 for up to 10 items, with free refreshments available. Customers are encouraged to bring their own bags.

SCRAP CAMPAIGN

Working with local councils we're tackling fly tipping with the SCRAP campaign. It's important to understand what is classed as fly tipping so you don't accidentally put yourself at risk of a fine.

MULTI-MILLION-POUND INVESTMENT AWARDED TO IMPROVE WALKING AND CYCLING IN ESSEX.

Essex County Council has secured £7.3 million from Active Travel England to improve walking and cycling across the county.

The county council has worked with city and district councils since 2020 to design a network of over 400 walking and cycling routes.

The funding announced today (12 February) will be used to deliver new walking and cycling schemes, maintain existing active travel provision and offer more community training, such as [Bikeability for school children](#).

The council will now review the detail of the funding and decide how to best allocate it to achieve the biggest impact and value for money.

MICROORGANISMS ARE BEING DEPLOYED ON ESSEX ROADS TO TRANSFORM THE WAY FUEL SPILLAGES ARE CLEARED

Essex Highways is using microbiology to clean up fuel spills as one of the first authorities to deploy microorganisms on a road network.

Traditional methods of clearing fuel spills rely on sand and other absorbent materials. This can require road closures for up to three to six hours, depending on the size, as well as costly clean-ups.

The Fuel Spill Digester is an eco-friendly alternative which uses natural bacteria and enzymes to quickly 'eat' fuel, oils and solvents spilled on roads.

As soon as the microorganism is sprayed onto a spill, the enzymes break down the fuel's harmful components while bacteria digest them.

Dangerous and slippery fuel is transformed into water within minutes and lanes can be reopened to traffic within an hour, depending on the size of the spillage.

Fuel Spill Digester is already used in some petrol stations but Essex County Council is one of the first local authorities to roll it out for use on a road network.

Some of the benefits include:

- quickly restoring roads back to safety within minutes, reducing closure delays
- only leaving behind water, reducing the costly and harmful need to dispose of contaminated absorbents via landfill
- works on tarmac, concrete and soil
